### Colloquium III

1974 Forward: A Review of Developments Since the National Conference on the State of Canadian Bibliography

At the invitation of the National Librarian, the third Colloquium of the Bibliographical Society of Canada will be held at the National Library of Canada in

Ottawa, 19-21 October 1978. The theme of Colloquium III is the review of bibliographical activity in Canada, in terms of developments since 1974 and in areas not fully explored at the Vancouver Conference. The programme includes papers and discussion on problems in funding for research and publication of bibliographical activity, the investigation of bibliographical work relating to Native Peoples, Canadian children's literature, multicultural materials, music, cartobibliography, Canadian publishing history and bibliographical methodology. Colloquium speakers include Miss Irene E. Aubrey, Miss Joyce Banks, Miss Maria Calderisi, Dr. Francess Halpenny, Dr. George Parker, Mrs. Martha Pluscauskas, Dr. Don Whiteside, Dr. Nancy Williamson, Miss Joan Winearls and others. The Colloquium fee is \$40.00. ### Errata

Two corrections to information published in the November 1977 Bulletin:

The account of the recent publishing history of Joseph Quesnel's <u>Colas et Colinette</u> (reported under the "Colloque sur l'histoire de l'imprimé") was incorrect. Dr. Helmut Kallmann (Chief, Music Division, National Library of Canada) originally located the composer's score in 1952. All that survive are the vocal and second violin parts, partly in the composer's and partly in a copyist's handwriting. The 1974 edition was a reconstruction of the score by Godfrey Ridout, for which Dr. Kallmann wrote an introduction. Dr. Kallmann's recent discovery was a group of letters in the John Neilson papers at the Public Archives of Canada in which Quesnel discusses the proposed printing of the music. These letters were apparently unknown to previous writers on Quesnel. My apologies to Dr. Kallmann and to Professor John Hare.

Apologies also to Miss Irene E. Aubrey (Children's Literature Librarian/Consultant, National Library of Canada). The title of the English edition of her 1975 supplement should have read Notable Canadian Children's Books - 1975 Supplement. Miss Aubrey and her assistants are currently working on an annotated listing of 1976 and 1977 imprints. The format of separate editions for French and English language works will be maintained for future supplements.

### **Obituaries**

HAZELGROVE, Allan Ronald Derrett (A.R.) died 21st March, 1978. Although an engineer and Librarian at Dupont in Kingston, Ron Hazelgrove became best known in recent years as a prolific and accomplished indexer. Among many such works, unlocking the information treasure in books particularly of the Kingston area, are the indexes to some half a dozen of the Ontario County Atlases. He retired just last spring, and his plan was to devote his retirement years to indexing the entire set of the Ontario Atlases. A mightier Plan intervened, but he will be remembered by this Society as one of Canada's most productive indexers.

HAMMER, William. Professor William Hammer (Department of Modern Languages, Carleton College, Northfield, Minnesota), who had been a member of the Society for over twenty years, died on 19 December 1976. No other information is available.

### Bibliography of Canadian Bibliographies

The <u>National Library News</u> for January-February 1978 contains a statement regarding the planned third edition of the <u>BCB</u>, outlining the history of earlier editions and the basis of cooperation between the National Library of Canada and the Society in preparing future editions. To quote briefly from this article:

The third edition of the <u>Bibliography</u> of <u>Canadian Bibliographies</u> will present a number of striking differences by comparison with its predecessors. All bibliographies listed in the new edition will be examined to ensure accuracy and consistency in description. Every item will be provided with a descriptive annotation, and with locations where pertinent. Indexes and unpublished bibliographies will be eliminated from the bibliography. Bibliographies appearing in serials, in publishers' catalogues, and in other published catalogues of significant collections, including private collections, will be included for the first time. The major expansion foreseen for the third edition of the <u>Bibliography</u> of <u>Canadian Bibliographies</u> will answer the needs of <u>Canadian scholars</u> and <u>librarians</u>. The compilation is expected to be ready for publication by 1980 . . .

### Canadian Institute for Historical Microreproduction

The Canadian Institute for Historical Microreproduction, a new independent nonprofit organization which held its first board meeting in Ottawa on March 15, has been awarded a \$2 million grant by the Canada Council for a massive program aimed at preserving and making available an important part of the Canadian heritage.

The grant, awarded for a 5-year period, will enable the Institute to seek out all Canadian works in print published before 1900 which are rare or scarce in Canada or are known to be in other countries, and to preserve and catalogue the material in microreproduction. Books, pamphlets and broadsheets in all subjects relating to Canada will be copied and made available to interested individuals, libraries and other institutions.

The Canadian Institute for Historical Microreproduction was recently set up by a group of independent Canadian scholars acting on the recommendation of the Council's Consultative Group on University Research Libraries and of the Commission on Canadian Studies, with some assistance from Canada Council staff members. Its purpose is to ensure the preservation and availability of written material by Canadians or about Canada or Canadians, mainly through the use, storage and dissemination of microreproductions.

The Institute is now actively seeking an executive director who will be in charge of its operations and will be assisted by a small staff. ## Annual Bibliography of the History of the Printed Book and Libraries (ABHB)

ABHB is a classified international bibliography published by the IFLA Committee on Rare and Precious Books and Documents under the editorship of Mr. H. D. L. Vervliet. Canadian contributions to the ABHB began with the volume for 1974 imprints. Contributions to the ABHB are the responsibility of designated national teams. The original Canadian team included Miss M. Brown, then Thomas Fisher Rare Book Librarian, and Miss L. Van der Bellen, Chief of the National Library of Canada's Rare Books and Manuscripts Division. Mr. P. Greig, Secretary of the Committee on Bibliographical Services for Canada, replaced Miss Brown as a member of the Canadian team in 1977. The ABHB contribution for 1977 imprints was recently submitted and work has already begun on 1978 imprints. The members of the Canadian team would welcome suggestions for additional Canadian sources, regardless of date, on the history of the printed book and libraries from members of the Bibliographical Society of Canada (attention: L. Archivaria. Ottawa: Association of Canadian Archivists, no. 1, 1975/76
Archivaria editor Edward H. Dahl plans to include an index to the first five numbers of Archivaria in the sixth number of the journal, to be published in May 1978. Several archivists are compiling the index on a voluntary basis, with the assistance of Peter Greig. Selective "Subject Indexes" in English and French have been prepared for The Archivist at two-volume intervals by members of the Public Archives of Canada staff. To date, each two-volume index, regardless of language, has only required a single leaf. The discontinuation of the indexes to the Labour Gazette and to the Gazette du travail, as prepared by Labour Canada/Travail Canada, was noted in the IASC/SCAD Newsletter, v. 1, no. 1, February 1978. These journals are also analyzed in Canadian Government Publications/Publications du gouvernement canadien (since 1963), Canadian Periodical Index/Index de périodiques canadiens (since 1947), International Labour Documentation and Périodex (since 1975). Both the level of treatment and the period of coverage offered by these services is limited in comparison with the service provided by Labour Canada/Travail Canada. Mr. William T. Jack (Director, Public Relations, Labour Canada) has recently announced that, following a departmental budget review, Labour Canada will resume its indexing service this year. The decision to resume the service was due to the number of representations received from agencies and associations, such as IASC/SCAD.

# OUP Quincentenary Exhibition at the University of Western Ontario

This year, 1978, the Oxford University Press is celebrating the quincentenary of printing in Oxford. To celebrate this very important occasion, a Quincentenary Exhibition of over three hundred items has been assembled. This Exhibition, which illustrates the five hundred year history of the Oxford University Press, will be displayed at only four locations: The Pierpont Morgan Library in New York City; The D. B. Weldon Library at The University of Western Ontario in London, Ontario; the Victoria and Albert Museum in London, England; and the International Book Fair in Frankfurt, Germany.

The Exhibition will be on display at the University of Western Ontario from 23 May through 7 June 1978. The hours of opening will be:

Monday to Thursday 10:00 a.m. - 9:00 p.m. Friday 10:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. Saturday 10:00 a.m. - 5:00 p.m. Sunday 1:00 p.m. - 5:00 p.m.

The Exhibition will include the manuscript of Toynbee's Study of History and the envelope on which he scribbled his first idea of the work while travelling on the Orient Express; it will also include a copy of the first book known to have been printed. This work, [Refinus of Aquileia] Expositio Sancti Hieronymi in symbolum apostolorum. Impressa Oxonie Et finita Anno Domini "1468" [1478], a commentary in Latin on the Apostles' Creed, set a puzzle for bibliographers by having a misprint which made it seem the book's date was 1468, rather than 1478: an x had dropped out of the roman numeral. There will be a copy of the Great Charter of Charles I to the University, dated 3 March 1636. There will be Bibles, Dictionaries and a portrait of Dr. Fell.

An illustrated catalogue of the Exhibition, compiled by Nicholas Barker, entitled The Oxford University Press and the Spread of Learning 1478-1978 will be available for purchase at the U.W.O. Bookstore.

## Deltev Voss Exhibition at North York

An exhibition of book designs, paper silhouettes, and engravings by graphic artist Deltev Voss will be on display 9 May through 17 June 1978 at the Fairview Library in Willowdale, Ontario. The exhibition is presented by the Canadiana Department of the North York Public Library. This is Canada's first exhibition of works by Voss, a German-born designer, illustrator, and engraver who emigrated to the Toronto area in 1951. From age ten Voss practised the art of cutting paper silhouettes and acquired a talent which earned him several commissions to illustrate books. He was also an accomplished wood and copper engraver. In 1964 he bought a small hand press and founded Paroquet Press which produced cards, booklets and two major books, Goethe's Novelle and Vondel's Gysbrecht van Aemstel.

The exhibition will be open for public viewing Tuesday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. and Saturday, 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The Fairview Library is at 35 Fairview Mall Drive, directly north of the Fairview Mall in Willowdale, Ontario. ### Work in Progress

Gwynneth Evans (Head, General Reference and Bibliography Section, National Library of Canada) has completed a "Bibliography of the Published Works of William Kaye Lamb" which is to appear in the <u>Festschrift</u> being edited by Dr. Wilfrid Smith and published by the University of British Columbia Press.

The manuscript of Dr. George Parker's <u>The Book Trade in Canada, 1751-1900</u> (reported in an earlier issue of the <u>Bulletin</u>), the first volume of a projected two-volume history, is now being typed for the press. Completion of the typescript is expected in the spring, when a publisher will be sought.

A 'Dictionary of Canadian Printers' Ornaments and Illustrations, 1751-1800' is being compiled at the Centre for Canadian Studies, Mount Allison University, under the direction of Douglas Lochhead. The work has been underway since October 1977 and over 2500 ornaments and illustrations have been copied and classified to date. The project is funded for the next few years. No publication date has been set.

Two subcommittees (English and French) of the Association of Canadian and Quebec Literatures/Association des littératures canadiennes et québécoises have been engaged in discovering what research in Canadian literature is in progress,—and, by inference, what is apparently being neglected. The English—Canadian results are being categorized under such heads as biographies of authors, criticism, literary history, cultural history, definitive editions, collections of letters, and indexes, bibliographies, and concordances. The two subcommittees will report their findings to the annual meeting of the Association at the Learned Societies Conference being held this spring at the University of Western Ontario.

Professors Allan Moscovitch and Peter Findlay (Centre for Social Welfare Studies, Carleton University) are coordinating an inventory of materials for the teaching of social policy and administration at Canadian colleges and universities. The project employs two full-time staff members (Ingrid Draayer, librarian, and Teresa Acton, social science researcher) and two part-time researchers. It has been funded by the Welfare Grants Division of the Federal Department of Health and Welfare. The coordinators would like information about the existence of documents or collections in this field, particularly unpublished manuscripts and material in private collections and archives. Peter Weinrich (136 Aylmer Avenue, Ottawa, KIS 2Y2), whose bibliography of Tim Buck was reviewed recently in the <u>Papers/Cahiers</u>, is now working on a much more extensive bibliography of the left in Canadian politics, including labour and trade unions. To date he has collected nearly 5000 entries.

- Drs. C. G. Roland and Peter Potter (Faculty of Health Sciences, McMaster University) are working on an annotated bibliography of Canadian medical periodicals from 1826 (the first) to the end of 1975. For a number of years Dr. Roland has also been collecting entries for a bibliography of the history of medicine in Canada. He would be interested in hearing from anyone with suggestions for entries in this bibliography. He hopes that a grant may soon make it possible to issue printouts of his listing using a Hollerith card system.
- Dr. A. Richardson (Acting Chairman, Department of History of Medicine and Science, University of Western Ontario) has a file of references relating to the development of science, medicine, and technology in Canada. He hopes eventually to have some sort of printed catalogue, but in the meantime the file may be consulted by any interested persons visiting UWO.

# Committee on Bibliographical Services for Canada/Comité des services bibliographiques pour le Canada

- 1. The CBSC is now turning its main attention from indexing and abstracting to an appraisal of the progress made to date on the fulfilment of the recommendations of the National Conference on the State of Canadian Bibliography, held in Vancouver, 22-24 May, 1974.
- 2. The CBSC is now implementing the recommendations of the Canadian Abstracting and Indexing Workshop which it sponsored in March of 1977. The principal one, that of forming an abstracting and indexing association, has already been acted upon; in fact, an Open Forum was held last June, and the Indexing and Abstracting Society of Canada has now almost completed a year of active existence, with our own Indexer to the Society, Mr. Peter Greig, as its first President.
- 3. The CBSC has completed and submitted a report to the National Library on the National Library's role and objectives. This report deals especially with the bibliographical responsibilities of the National Library, and was issued to members of the CBSC as Document Received no. 44.
- 4. The CBSC has now prepared its first Annual Report -- another achievement of Mr. Peter Greig. A copy is available on request to him, as Secretary of the CBSC, after the 1st of April.
- 5. The next meeting of the CBSC will be on the 24th of April. The agenda has been fitted into the morning, so that the entire afternoon may be devoted to a discussion of the funding of bibliographical activities in Canada.

#### Books for Review
