# 2.) MINUTES OF THE 1988 ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING IN WINDSOR

The forty-third annual meeting of the Bibliographical Society of Canada/Société bibliographique du Canada was held with the Learned Societies on Tuesday, 31 May, 1988 at the Business Building, University of Windsor.

- 1. The Tremaine Medal was presented to Sandra Alston. In the absence of Eric Swanick, Chair of the Trwemaine Medal Committee, the citation was read by the Society President. Sandra Alston thanked the Society.
- 2. The following papers were read:

"Grip and the Bengoughs as Publishers and Printers"

Mme. M.K. Roy, Université de Moncton
"Les sources documentaires acadiennes: inventaires et mises a jour récentes"

Dr. I.S. MacLaren, University of Alberta "Creating Travel Literature in the Nineteenth Century"

Dr. D.M.R. Bentley and Dr. R.J. Shroyer, University of Western Ontario
"The Canadian Poetry Press Editions of Early Canadian Poems: The First Phase"

- 3. The business portion of the meeting followed the afternoon session of the papers. The President welcomed members and guests and called the meeting to order.
- 4. The adoptio n of the agenda was moved by Sandra Alston, seconded by Joanne Henning. CARRIED.
- 5. The minutes of the forty-second annual general meeting were published in the May issue of the <u>Bulletin</u>. It was moved by Beth Miller, seconded by Bruce Whiteman, that these minutes be adopted. CARRIED.
- 6. The President reported on a number of issues:
- i. The first Vice-President, George Parker, has decided for personal reasons not to advance to the position of President. The second Vice-President, Apollonia Steele, has decided for personal reasons not to advance to the position of first Vice-President. Both members of Council will be missed and were thanked for their many years of participation. Council has decided that the first Vice-President will be responsible for conferences and that the second Vice-President will be responsible for membership. In the light of these resignations the President has agreed to remain in that position for another term of one year.
- ii. The Secretary/Treasurer, William Stoneman, submitted his resignation in order to take up a position in the United States. Council has decided to split the position because of the work load involved.
- iii. The editor of the <u>Papers/Cahiers</u>, Patricia Stone, has submitted her resignation after a five-year term.
- iv. The President reported that the sale of publications of the Society had only realized a small amount of money.

- v. The President reported that the winner of the Tremaine Fellowship for 1988 was Carl Spadoni who planned to work on "Gone With the Wind: The Canadian Issue and Dutch Piracy". The President encouraged other members of the Society to consider applying for the Fellowship.
- vi. The President reported that applications had been submitted on behalf of the Society to the Social Science and Humanities Research Council of Canada under the programmes of Aid and Attendance Grants and Aid to Learned Journals, and under the Canadian Studies Research Tools Program.
- vii. The President reported that after a lengthy discussion the Council had decided not to raise membership fees for the coming year.
- 3. The Secretary/Treasurer submitted an interim report. He reported that while the Society had sufficient funds to continue its operations, the publication of the <u>Papers/Cahiers</u> was costing more and more and was using a larger portion of annual income. It is hoped that the application to the SSHRCC for specific support for the <u>Papers/Cahiers</u> will aid this situation.

# 9. Report of the Nominating Committee

In the absence of the Chair of the Nominating Committee, Liana Van der Bellen, assisted by Claude Lemoine, presented the slate of officers of the Society for the year 1988-89. (Published in the November, 1988 <u>Bulletin</u>.) It was moved by Joyce Banks, seconded by Patricia Stone, that the slate of officers be accepted. CARRIED. It was moved by Peter McNally, seconded by Judy Donnelly, that Liana Van der Bellen be asked to fill the position of Secretary. CARRIED.

With the support of Council it was suggested by the outgoing Review Editor of the <u>Papers/Cahiers</u>, Bruce Whiteman, that this position be split in two, one for French and one for English publications. Subsequently, Yvan Lamonde agreed to act as French Review Editor and Carl Spadoni as English Review Editor.

- 10. The Editor of the <u>Papers/Cahiers</u> reported that volume 26 was at press in April and would be mailed to members early in the fall.
- 11. As previously agreed, the next meeting of the Society will be held on June 20, 1989 in Edmonton in conjunction with the Canadian Library Association. Mary Lu MacDonald urged that a presence be maintained at the Learned Societies meeting at Université Laval in 1989.

#### 12. Other Business

- i. Peter McNally urged Council to condsider the role of Honorary President, a position held by Marie Tremaine until her death. He urged Council to take this opportunity to review the constitution of the Society and to publish an up-to-date version.
- ii. Beth Miller urged the Editor of the Bulletin to include a work-in-progress section in the Bulletin.
- iii. Ernest Ingles thanked Rhys Williams and Joanne Henning for their efforts in preparing a stimulating and enjoyable programme for the annual general meeting.
- iv. The President thanked those members of Council and officers whose terms ended this year: Mary Lu MacDonald (Council 1985-88), Apollonia Steele (2nd Vice-President 1986-88), Milada Vlach (Council 1984-88), George Parker (1st Vice-President 1986-88), Patricia Stone (Editor, Papers/Cahiers 1984-88), William Stoneman (Secretary/Treasurer 1984-88).
- 13. It was moved by Rhys Williams, seconded by many others, that the meeting be adjourned.

NOTICE OF MOTION TO CHANGE A SOCIETY BY-LAW PROPOSED FOR APPROVAL AT THE ANNUAL MEETING

The following amendment to the Society's By-laws has been recommended. The first sentence of By-law 2.d. now reads:

A nominating Committee appointed by the Council, not more than six months before the Annual Meeting, shall submit to the Annual Meeting a list of nominations of Officers and Councillors to be voted upon at the meeting.

It is recommended that this sentence be amended to read:

A nominating Committee shall be appointed by the Council to assume office not more than twelve months before the Annual Meeting. The Committee shall solicit nominations from the membership for Officers and Councillors, shall notify the membership of nominees at least one month in advance of the Annual Meeting, and shall submit the names to the Annual Meeting for its approval.

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# MARIE TREMAINE MEDAL 1989

Eric Swanick, Chairman of the Tremaine Medal Committee, has announced that the 1989 Marie Tremaine Medal for outstanding service to Canadian bibliography in the form of publishing, teaching, and professional activities, will be awarded to Professor Gloria Strathern, of the University of Alberta.

# MARIE TREMAINE FELLOWSHIPS

No Fellowships were awarded this year.

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#### BERNARD AMTMAIN FELLOWSHIP

At its final meeting, held March 1989, the Board of Directors of the Amtmann Circle voted to dissolve. The Circle, composed of book collectors, booksellers, librarians, and archivists, had been formed to foster the aims for which Bernard Amtmann, often called he dean of Canadian booksellers, had been renowned.

At the meeting, the Board voted that the remaining assets of the Circle be consolidated and used to fund a fellowship to be named after Bernard Amtmann to foster study in the fields which were of interest to him, namely Canadiana, book collecting, bookselling, and bibliography. The Bibliographical Society of Canada was asked to administer the fellowship and the Council agreed that this task would be undertaken by the Fellowship Committee. The fellowship will be for \$1,500 and will be awarded every three years; the first year in which it will be given is 1992. Special consideration will be given to those working on some aspect of the book trade. The fellowship is open to scholars of all nationalities and to non-members of the Society.

A brochure providing information on both the Tremaine and Amtmann fellowships will be prepared by the Society for all interested applicants.

The biography of Bernard Amtmann by John Archer and John Mappin, published the Circle as its final volume, will now be available from the Bibliographical Society of Canada. All proceeds from the sale of the biography will be used to support the fellowship fund.

#### PUBLICATION OF INTEREST TO MEMBERS

Elizabeth Bloomfield and Gilbert A. Stelter have recently completed Guelph and Wellington County: Bibliography of Settlement and Development since 1800 (Guelph Regional Project, University of Guelph, paper, 350 pp.). The Guelph Regional Project (GRP) is developing a comprehensive guide to the history of Ontario regions and counties in two research tools. First is the bibliography of all published and secondary material relating to Guelph and Wellington County. An inventory of primary and archival sources for the same area will be published soon. Contents of this first GRP volume include introductory essays by Stelter and Bloomfield, an annotated bibliography of 1,716 items, organized thematically and by specific localities, and indexes of authors, places, subject headings, persons cited in the published material, and corporate subjects (businesses, municipalities, churches, schools, clubs, and societies cited in the published material). Guelph and Wellington County costs \$20 when purchased at the University of Guelph, \$22.50 when payment accompanies order by mail, and \$27.50 if not prepaid and an invoice is required.
